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Epic Firsts

We continue our members' stories about their forays into the world of British cars. The passion shines through! *Thank you, John and Jay, for sharing these stories about your treasures!*

Our first MG John Leible

Back in 1997 Deb and I took a ride in our every day driver to Lewiston NY. But before that in my college days, my friend had a Triumph Spitfire that I was envious of. So on journey to Lewiston we were going down Pekin hill on route 429. Just before descending down the hill, I spotted out of the corner of my eye what I thought was a Spitfire on the front lawn. I said to Deb, "There's a Spitfire for sale. We should look at it." Her response was, "Ok" **so I proceeded to make a 180 right in the middle of the hill** and went back to the car. To my surprise it was not a Spitfire but a 1979 Brooklands green MG Midget. I fell in love with the car at first sight. I went the front door of the owner but no one was home. In my disappointment I wrote down the phone number from the windshield. The next day I called the owner and made arrangements to meet them that evening. When we met she told me the story about the car; she purchased it right out of college along with a 1979 Camaro at the same time as an everyday driver. She also told me that the Midget was taken off the road every Fall - which I believed because after 18 years, the car had only 27000 miles. After some negotiating, the car was mine and I drove it home with the biggest smile on my face. I had the car painted and put a new slave cylinder in it and proceeded to have years of fun. We went to 7 or 8 NAMGBR conventions and took home five 1st place awards during that time. Over the years I sort of grew out of the Midget and purchased a MGB. But that story is for another time.

Working on British Cars and Learning Experiences Jay Lockrow

For the most part I have always done most of my own work. I feel this is part of the fun and learning experience. I recall looking for a workshop manual for the TC for some time and eventually found a pretty good one. These are fine for such things as what to lubricate and when, how much water, oil, or other fluids are needed, how to disassemble certain units etc. **But what they do not do is tell you what to do when you get things apart.** Now if a part is broken it is obvious that it needs to be repaired or replaced. But why did it break and what can you do to prevent this in the future? Years ago an acquaintance from down east wrote a book called *The XPAG engine*. This just dealt with the engine from the MG TB,TC,TD and TF. There is a drawing in the book showing the timing gear and timing chain setup. I did this drawing probably fifty years ago. This book is your bible for the T series engine. It tells you things you can do while it is apart to improve performance, reliability even smoothing out the idle. This is the difficult part to learn. For example when I had the TR3, for some time I had the car it would just stop for no apparent reason. I checked lots of things and it would usually start right up. Then again it would just quit. It was not the condenser, points, distributor cap or any of the obvious so one day I started pulling or pushing wires and one came off in my hand. It was a wire to the coil and it was broken about two inches from the end under the insulation. You could stop or restart the engine by moving this wire up, down or sideways. I replaced it and I never had another problem.

Certain cars have idiosyncrasies that today would justify a re-call. It used to be you would hear about certain problems that might happen to a car that you owned so you could check these things out ahead of time. Some times it would pay off others time not. But the learning curve is there you just have to keep at it. I could most likely spend hours telling about little gremlins I have found in cars but the knowledge is not in the books it is in working and recalling what and where to look.
